WHAT ARE SAINT CHRISTY UNIVERSITY'S ACADEMIC CREDENTIALS?

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary is non-academic religious nonpublic postsecondary institution. However, Saint Christy University is currently seeking to gain an Affiliate Member of Association of Biblical Higher Education, an organization which is recognized by the US Department of Education ensuring that Saint Christy University is a credible institution of Biblical learning.

How much does it cost to apply to saint christy university?

The application process is completely free—Saint Christy University currently requires no fees for applying to St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary.

CAN I RECEIVE CREDIT FOR PREVIOUS COLLEGE & SEMINARY TRAINING OR FOR MINISTRY EXPERIENCE?

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary works closely with the student to make transfer of credits into Saint Christy University's possible in many cases. While a certain number of courses must be completed through St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary for each non-academic degree program, transfer credits can often be accepted, especially at the undergraduate level. Also, in many cases, St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary can work with the student so that the student need not repeat previously completed courses at St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary - approved institutions. Substitutions will be made in such cases where allowed/recommended by the St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary Academic ReviewCommittee.

GREAT COMMISSION FOCUSED

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary strives constantly to remind its student body that Biblical Education is not for the purpose of gaining knowledge for the sake of knowledge, but for the purpose of building up the Body of Christ so that she feels compelled to reach out to the lost world around her with the gospel of Jesus Christ. The world without Christ is doomed to eternal Hell, and Saint Christy instills within its students to do the work of the Kingdom while there is still time, time which may cease to be at any moment with the coming of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

KINGDOM READY

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary believes in and teaches the eternal security of the Christian, who is indwelt by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. But Christians will be strictly judged (1Cor 3.11-15) at the Judgment Seat of Christ to see whether or not they have earned any rewards as they prepare to enter the Millennial Kingdom of Christ. For those who have been slothful stewards, the judgment will be severe. But for those who have readied themselves as workmen rightly dividing the Word of truth and who have done the work of a faithful steward of the Gospel, rewards will be granted, and they will co-rule with Christ in the Kingdom. St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary seeks to instill a deep desire for preparing for this judgment and for earning the rewards of the Kingdom.

DOCTRINAL STATEMENT OF THE SEMINARY (SEMINARY STUDENTS ONLY)

ARTICLE I-THE SCRIPTURES

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness" (2 Tim 3.16).

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary understands "by inspiration of God" to mean that the whole Bible is inspired in the sense that God's Holy Spirit moved holy men of God to pen the very words of Scripture. The words are fully God's words, though He used human penmen to achieve the writing of the Bible.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary further understands that God's inspiration extends equally and fully to all parts of the Bible—historical, poetical, doctrinal, and prophetical.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary further holds that this inspired work has been fully preserved in the King James Version of the Bible without error or contradiction.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary understands that the Scriptures are centered upon the King, Jesus Christ, and His kingdom.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary further understands that the no passage of

Scripture is properly understood until it leads to Jesus Christ. St. Christy University of

Theology & Seminary holds that all Scripture is given for practical instruction in our daily

Christian walk with God.

ARTICLE II-THE TRIUNE GOD

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THE TRINITY

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary believes that there is only one true and living God, revealed in both the Old and New Testament of the Holy Bible. He alone is the Creator, Sustainer, and Redeemer God. He is omniscient, omnipotent, and omnipresent.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that God eternally exists in three persons —God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. These three persons are one God, having exactly the same nature and essence. Each person is worthy of identical praise and obedience.

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GOD THE FATHER

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that God as Father personally rules over His universe and all of its inhabitants.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary believes that God the Father has preordained the outcome of human history according to the purposes of His grace as revealed by the Holy Bible.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary further holds God is Father to all who come to personal faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Redeemer.

GOD THE SON

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that Christ is the eternal Son of God, uncreated and identical to the Father in essence and nature.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that Christ was active in the creation of the universe, and He is the Sustainer of all the universe.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds firmly to the fact that Christ was conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. As such, He was born without the sin nature that has tainted mankind since the Fall of Adam.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary further holds that Jesus perfectly revealed and performed the will of the Father. Though fully God, He took upon Himself human nature with its accompanying demands and necessities so that He was fully man, yet He remained without sin.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary believes that by His substitutionary death on the cross Jesus Christ made provision for the redemption of all men from sin.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary further holds that after three days and nights, Jesus Christ was raised from the dead with a glorified physical body, in which He appeared to His disciples. Forty days following His resurrection, Christ ascended into heaven and is now exalted at the right hand of God.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary believes that currently, Christ serves as the only Mediator between God and mankind.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that at His bodily second coming, Jesus Christ will return in power and glory to judge the world and to consummate His redemptive mission.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary further holds that all people owe their allegiance and obedience to Christ as Savior and Lord.

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GOD THE HOLY SPIRIT

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that the Holy Spirit, as the Spirit of God, is the third member of the Trinity and that He is fully God.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary believes that as God He inspired holy men of old to write the Scriptures and that through the Holy Spirit, He enables men to understand truth.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that He calls men to the Savior, and effects regeneration. At the moment of regeneration, He baptizes every believer into the Body of Christ. Following the Day of Pentecost, He came into the world in a special sense so that He is present within each believer. Once He has taken up residence within the believer, He will never abandon that believer, regardless of his merit or worth.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that He works within each Christian in manifold ways.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that the Spirit seals the believer unto the day of final redemption.

ARTICLE III—MAN

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that man originally was created in Adam in the image and likeness of God.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that man fell in Adam through sin, and as a result of his fall, man lost his spiritual life, and became dead in trespasses and in sin. This fallen nature has been communicated to every person, excepting Christ Jesus, who was born of a virgin. As a fallen and sinful creature, man is devoid of spiritual life, needing Divine grace to secure his restoration to fellowship with God.

ARTICLE IV—SALVATION

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that man is saved by God's grace alone, with man's works and efforts being completely excluded. Neither baptism nor any other ordinance affects salvation to any degree whatsoever.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that salvation is by faith alone in Christ alone.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that salvation is available to all but is effective only for those who by faith accept the completed work of Jesus Christ on Calvary's cross. Man's redemption is achieved solely by the blood of Jesus Christ, who served as man's Divine Substitute, being made a curse and sin for us so that He might die in our place.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that no person can enter into the Kingdom of God unless he is born again of the Spirit of God.

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ARTICLE V—ETERNAL SECURITY

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that due to nature of God's saving grace, that all believers are kept saved until the day of redemption and even forever.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary further holds that God will not overlook sin in the believer but will chasten them with Divine correction in love. At no time during this chastening process is a believer's secure position in jeopardy, but his fellowship with God is broken. Upon repentance from sin and upon asking for forgiveness of sin, Christ will restore the believer to fellowship with God.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that ultimately Jesus Christ will present the believer faultless before the throne of God. No believer shall be lost from the grasp of the Persons of the Trinity.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary believes that a believer can have full assurance of their salvation and security in Christ from the moment that he places his trust in Jesus Christ as Savior.

ARTICLE VI—THE CHURCH

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that all believers from the Day of Pentecost until the Rapture of the Church prior to the Tribulation of the last days are members of the Church, the Body of Christ and the Bride of Christ. Having begun at Pentecost and not before, the Church is wholly separate from and distinct from Israel.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds all believers of this present age, whether Jew or Gentile, are baptized by the Spirit into the Body of Christ.

ARTICLE VII—THE ORDINANCES

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St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that there are two and only two ordinances for the Church, these being water baptism by immersion and the Lord's Supper. Baptism serves as a sign that a person who is already saved through the blood of Christ alone is identifying himself with the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ and the new life which He alone can grant. The Lord's Supper is a memorial, looking back to the cross of Jesus Christ and the blood which He shed upon that cross, and is anticipatory, looking forward to the return of Jesus at His coming again.

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ARTICLE VIII-LAST THINGS

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that the Rapture of the Church prior to the coming Tribulation is the next great event in the fulfillment of biblical prophecy. This rapture will be due to the Lord Jesus Christ coming in the air to call out all members of His Church, both living and dead, to meet Him in the air. He will then immediately remove these saints to Heaven, where He has prepared a home for them. They will be judged at the Bema Judgment, the Judgment Seat of Christ for eternal rewards, salvation already having been secured.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that following the Rapture of the Church, the world will undergo the most severe of judgments, fulfilling Daniel's Seventieth Week, a time known as the Tribulation and a time of Israel's trouble. The Tribulation will end with the Second Coming of Christ, who will fight the Battle of Armageddon and who will defeat the Antichrist and the False Prophet.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that at the Second Coming of Christ, following the Battle of Armageddon and the Judgment of Israel and the Judgment of the Nations, the Lord Jesus Christ will introduce the Kingdom of God upon earth. This Kingdom will endure throughout the Millennium, the literal one-thousand year reign of Christ upon earth and will bring about a lifting of the curse which now rests upon all creation. Israel, having been purged and judged, will dwell safely within the Promised Land, and the Church, having been judged, will rule with Christ over the nations of the earth. Satan shall be bound for the thousand years, being released at the end of the period to raise an army to resist and attack God and His holy saints. Satan and his army shall be destroyed immediately, and the final judgment of lost souls, the GreatWhite Throne Judgment, shall ensue.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that following the Great White Throne Judgment, Christ shall yield up the Kingdom to the Father, that God might be all in all. All believers from all ages shall dwell with Christ in glory throughout all eternity. All unsaved sinners shall be cast into the Lake of Fire, where they shall be tormented day and night for all eternity.

ARTICLE IX-THE FAMILY

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary affirms and values God's gift of marriage between man and woman that God created in His own image. Genesis 1.27, "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him: male and female created he them." As St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary is committed to providing our students with a biblical worldview, St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary believes and practices what the Bible says about marriage and operates by faith according to that faith commitment.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary abides by Jesus' teaching on marriage when he said in Matthew 19.4b-6, "... Have ye not read, that he which made them at the beginning made them male and female, And said, for this cause shall a man leave his father and mother and shall cleave to his wife: and they twain shall be one flesh? Wherefore they are no more twain, but one flesh. What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder." The definition of marriage provided by Jesus includes several important truths that St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary expects all board members, faculty members, seminary students, and staff to value and abide by. Firstly, marriage is a covenant designed by God (Matthew 19.4b). Secondly, His biblical definition of marriage is not conditioned by cultural or personal perspective but decided by God from the beginning and expected to continue until eternity (Matthew 19.4b-6). Thirdly, marriage is intended to be between one man and one woman as God biologically created them male and female at birth (Matthew 19.4b). Hence, any other proposals for marriage are outside of God's intended design (see Leviticus 18.22; 20:13-16; Romans 1.26-27; 1Corinthians 6.9-11; and 1Timothy 1.9-10). Fourthly, the marriage covenant is sealed through sexual intercourse which should be reserved for one husband and one wife after they have entered the holy covenant of marriage (Matthew 19.5). Fifthly, God's design is for marriage to last until the death of one of the spouses (Matthew 19.6; 22.30)

Therefore, **St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary** defines marriage as a divinely designed biblical covenant between one man and one woman and God that is intended to represent the relationship of Christ and the Church. This view of marriage is affirmed by the authorized King James Bible in both its Old and New Testaments. (See Genesis 1.27; 2.23-24; Malachi 2.14; Song of Solomon 2.7, 16; 1 Corinthians 7.1-16; Ephesians 5.22-33; Hebrews 13.4).

ARTICLE X—THE GREAT COMMISSION

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary holds that it is the explicit commandment of Jesus Christ to all believers to go forth into the world to spread the Gospel message of the Person and Work of Jesus Christ on Calvary's cross.

Non-academic Earned Program

This has been popularly referred to as degree by thesis program. The degrees offered in this program are earned as with our standard program. Textbooks are not used, so it is considered a nonacademic program.

This degree recognizes the experience you have gained through your years in ministry. It gives you a chance to further improve yourself by researching and presenting a field of study that interests you.

You may choose a topic of interest from our list. You then research the topic using books you have in your own library or that you purchase. From this research you write a paper presenting your ideas.

This program currently offers undergraduate and gradual level courses in diverse majors and specializations to meet your career aspirations and or organizational demands. There are age and ministry experience requirements to enter this program. However, future programs will be added based on need of the applicant.

Non-Earned Nonacademic Program

Although it is the primary function of **St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary** to educate and equip students, it is a time-honored tradition of educational institutions to confer honorary degrees to people who have distinguished themselves in their ministries and communities. Accreditation

Notice Regarding National/Regional Accreditation

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary is *not* nationally/regionally accredited. We have not sought to become regionally accredited currently but hope to do so in the possible near future.

National/Regional accreditation would involve coming under governmental regulations that may not be in harmony with our view of biblical ethics and principles. To come under such control, which is not required by law or necessary to remain accountable, we feel would impede our ability to follow the specific calling of our Lord to equip leaders in His church.

It is important for the potential student to know that some education institutions require that any credits transferred into their institution come from a regionally accredited school. Also, many State agencies require a degree from a regionally accredited school to receive certification.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary has no control over what other institutions or agencies accept. *The potential student is strongly encouraged to discuss with the* St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary *staff how you plan to use your degree from* St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary.

School Policies

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Admission Requirements

Nonacademic Earned Programs

Undergraduate

- 1. Must be eighteen years of age or older.
- 2. Must have a High School Diploma, GED or equivalent (could be waived with documented ministry experience of not less than 4 years)
- 3. Must be able to demonstrate how the degree program will be funded.
- 4. Completed application for admission form with photo must be on file at **St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary**.
- 5. Transcripts of all previous academic work must be on file.

Graduate School

- 1. Must be twenty-one years of age or older.
- 2. Must have completed a Bachelor's degree (for master's program could be waived with documented ministry experience of not less than 7 years)
- 3. Must have completed a Master's degree in the same field as desired post-graduate degree or equivalent (for Doctoral applicants- could be waived with documented ministry experience of not less than 10 years).
- 4. Must be able to demonstrate how the degree program will be funded.

- 6. All previous balances must be satisfied.

Nonacademic Non-Earned Program

All applicants seeking nomination for the award of an honorary degree from any of the undergraduate and or graduate programs in this student catalog must meet all the criteria set below

- 1. Must be thirty years of age or older.
- Must be able to document relevant years in a primary ministry (undergraduate - 7 yrs. min.; masters - 9years min.; doctoral 12years min.).
- 3. Application must be on file.
- 4. Completed application for admission form with photo must be on file at **St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary.**
- 5. Final decision will be made on a case-by-case basis per applicant's years in ministry.

 Final admission decision rests with St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary Inc.
 Must be willing to donate to St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary. There is no charge for honorary degrees, however, this type of degree will only be issued to deserving and outstanding candidates who contributes towards the cause of St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary.

Student Code of Conduct

Students are expected to conduct themselves according to biblical ethics as highlighted below.

- 1. Students must have previously professed Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior and consider themselves to be Hisdisciple.
- 2. Students should submit to the authority of Scriptures in matters of faith and conduct at the control of the Holy Spirit and to the biblical authority of those placed over the student (e.g., professors, advisors, staff and other university personnel).
- 3. Students must be respectful in their dealings with other students, professors and university office staff at all times. Derogatory and inflammatory conduct that is demeaning will be immediately handled.
- 4. All communications including phone calls and letters to faculty and staff should be held to the highest standards of Christian behavior. Any critical, demeaning or disrespectful communications are grounds for immediate suspension by the university.
- 5. Students should address professors with respect. Words such as "Sir, Ma'am, Doctor, Reverend, and Brother and Sister" are acceptable modes of speech. Disrespectful titles, phrases, or any form of questionable language will not be tolerated.
- 6. Students will be expected to pursue integrity in all areas of life especially in their academic life. They shall do their own work. Plagiarism will not be tolerated.

Disciplinary Action

A Disciplinary Review Board (DRB) will be convened on the recommendation of any dean, professor, instructor or university administrative employee to review any violation of the Student Code of Conduct (SCC) by a student. The DRB shall have the authority to recommend the suspension or expulsion of the student found in violation of the SCC. The Dean or President shall act on the recommendation of the DRB in the event that one or both are currently not sitting on the review board.

The term of suspension can be up to three months. During this time the suspended student may not attended classes or submit work for credit. During this time, it is hoped that the student will make amends from their violation. The DRB may stipulate that at the end of the term of suspension the board will perform a review to ensure the student has complied with the SCC.

A student having been expelled will be automatically dismissed from the Institute and dropped from the rolls. As a specific exception to the Institute's refund policy, no refund of any type shall be given to any student who has been expelled for a violation of the SCC.

DRB records will remain confidential. In the case of the student reapplying to the Institute for the same or different program, the records may be reviewed to verify the student's compliance to standard admission requirements as well as the SCC.

Student Appeal

Any student dissatisfied with the action of the Disciplinary Review Board (DRB) or the Academic Dean or Vice-Chancellor, may appeal to the DRB in writing within 30 days of the disciplinary action. The Institute's legal counsel will review the entire record and determine the reasonableness of the action(s) of the DRB. This is the "court of last appeal" for such review of a DRB decision/action.

Measurement of Student's Performance

Earned-Nonacademic programs receive a Pass/Fail evaluation and are not awarded grade points.

To graduate, a student must pass all courses taken and shall be in goodstanding.

Grade Appeals

Students who are dissatisfied with an assigned grade may appeal the grade by notifying, by letter, the Dean. A copy of the disputed work and the grade sheet should be forwarded to the Dean.

The student must describe in writing the reason for their dissatisfaction. A decision on the appeal will be made within sixty days. Students will be notified by letter of the decision.

Life Experience Credit

One of the benefits of a nontraditional study program is the freedom to acknowledge ministerial experience that you bring to St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary. A student may include ministerial experience information on their application. An evaluation will be made of your experience. A maximum number of points may be applied to satisfy your requirements for a degree in our standard program. The maximum number is 30 points (applied only on core courses) for undergraduate and 10 points (applied only on core courses) for graduate and above. Earned-Nonacademic program points may be applied to reduce the number of pages required for that program. Please note that credits may be applied only once in a student's nonacademic career. That is, a student who receives LE Credits for an undergraduate program may not receive LE Credits for subsequent programs (e.g., graduate or doctorate).

Transferred Credits

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary accepts credits from other recognized educational institutions. These credits accepted must be from classes that correspond to classes in the applicant's desired degree program. Determination of accepted credits will be considered during the admission evaluation process.

Minimum Number of Points

For purposes of matriculation and transferred credits, a minimum of credits must be taken with St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary to receive a degree.

- 45 points for undergraduate degrees
- 20 points for master's and doctoral

degrees. You never pay for points transferred in for a degree.

Financial Policy of St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary

Tuition Payments

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary offers students several tuition plans to pay for their education. You can pay your tuition in three easy installments, or you can spread the payments over several months. All plans are interest free. Another option is to pay your tuition all up front for a substantial discount.

Discounts

- 10% discount for paying full tuition upon admission acceptance to St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary.
- 5% discount for paying tuition within 35 days.

Payment Options

US Check or Money Order

You may pay your tuition with a Check drawn from a US bank. You may also use a Money Order or Cashier's check drawn off a US or Canadian government or financial institution. Students outside the US or Canada may also use Money Orders, Cashier's checks, or possibly arrange payments through Western Union, MoneyGram, or by a major credit card.

Credit Card

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary offers you the option to pay tuition by credit card. All major cards are accepted. This applies to payment plans for the full tuition or the three payment (or less) installment plans. Also, for monthly payment plans of \$100.00 or above.

Returned Checks

Checks that are returned to our financial office will be accessed a NSF fee. The student will be placed on financial hold until their account is brought up to date—including all incurred fees.

Overdue Accounts

Students that pay for their tuition interest free over time and fall behind in their payments may be placed on financial hold. A student on hold will not be sent any new courses nor receive any grades, diplomas or transcript.

Students on a payment plan are required to sign a contract stating that they will make payments in a timely manner. Students who stop making payments without contacting the financial office will be in default of their contract and may be placed on inactive status. In certain cases, their tuition balance may be considered due before academic activity may resume.

In any case, if you fall behind and are in trouble, contact the financial office as soon as possible. *We are here to help!*

Textbooks and Study Materials

If issued, all students with US and Canadian mailing addresses will receive their textbooks and course material as part of their tuition, including postage and handling. Some advanced degree programs involve selective readings and dissertations that require the purchase of additional books by the student. Students may be required to cover the costs of textbooks lost or stolen including postage and handling of replacement textbooks and materials.

In some cases, workbooks are used in courses. Upon completion of submitting coursework for grading, the student may wish their course work would be returned to them (including workbooks). If so desired, the student should so indicate by including a note stating his or her wish to have the work returned. Along with the note, include a check or money order to cover the cost of shipping and handling (usually \$25–\$50). If you have any questions, please contact the dean's office.

All students living outside of the contiguous 48 states and Canada will be required to pre-pay for textbooks, shipping and handling, as we cannot guarantee shipping to these destinations. These students will be required to cover these expenses. Any overage will be applied as a credit to their account.

Graduation Fees

Candidates for graduation *may* elect to travel to attend Commencement Exercises at locations as shall be determined by St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary. Students who so elect will be charged a fee of \$200.00. Exact fees are subject to change due to the variation of cap and gown fees; also, other costs may vary.

All fees, tuition, etc., *must be paid* before graduation. No exceptions please.

Refund Policy

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary will give a refund to a student for tuition only in the amount of 50% for paid tuition in the following circumstances.

The student withdraws from St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary (see Withdraw Policy below) within two weeks from the time we receive their signed and fully completed contract. The student sends an official letter to St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary, signed by the registered student, requesting the refund.

The refund will be less any textbooks, syllabi or other school material (including postage and handling) that may have been sent to the student if not returned. Postage and handling, fees, and other expenses of the university are nonrefundable.

Paying tuition does not guarantee a passing grade. Students receiving unsatisfactory grades (typically an F) will not pass their course and cannot graduate. Receiving such grades do not constitute grounds for receiving a refund.

In any event, St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary will attempt to act in the goodwill of the student.

Withdraw Policy

A student is considered *withdrawn* upon the receipt of an official letter requesting that he/she be withdrawn from the rolls of St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary. If the student wishes to reenroll in the Institute, he/she may do so within one year's time from being taken off the rolls subject to the approval of the Academic Board. Afterthat time a reinstatement fee will be assessed.

After two years, a former student will need to reapply to the Institute. They will be treated as a new student. Any credits previously taken may be applied towards their degree. However, the student will be subject to the academic requirements and policies in place at the time they are readmitted. Previous curriculum and policies may not apply.

Automatic Withdraw

Any student that is placed on inactive status for whatever reason and does not contact the Institute to rectify the situation will be automatically withdrawn after ninety (90) days.

Graduation Policy

Students are eligible to graduate once all their requirements have been met with a minimum graduation point required for their program. All financial responsibilities must have been met.

At this point their diploma and transcript will be sent to the student, now a graduate.

The graduate *is not required* to attend graduation ceremonies. If elected to attend graduation, a graduation fee will be accessed.

All graduates not attending graduation will be considered to graduate *in absentia*.

Transcripts

At the completion of all required studies, financial agreements and the awarding of diplomas, graduates will receive an official transcript. The transcript for all earned-nonacademic degrees will have the titles of their completed courses along with a Pass/ Fail grade listed on their transcripts. Non-Earned nonacademic degrees will only have a copy of written works submitted to St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary in lieu of courses shall be listed on their said transcripts. In some cases, prospective employers may request to see your transcript. Most bonafide educational institutions that allow you to transfer credits will usually require a copy of your transcript. Additional copies of transcripts will be sent to graduates at a cost of \$20.00 each. Honorary degree recipients will not receive a transcript.

Earned versusunearned

An earned degree is more distinguished than an unearned degree. By *earned* we mean the recipient worked for the degree. This degree is differentiated from a degree obtained from a *degree mill* or a mail order degree.

An *unearned* degree is one bestowed upon an individual who has made an exceptional contribution to their community or congregation. This is known as an *Honorary Degree*.

Salvation is the only thing that is worth more than what you put into it. And certainly, there is more worth to the individual to obtain the earned degree. The earned degree prepares the individual for the work of the Lord, whereas the unearned degree recognizes the lifetime of work that has already been accomplished for the Lord by an individual.

Academic versus nonacademic

The same analogy can be applied here. An academic degree prepares the individual for excellence in their field of study. The nonacademic degree is for ministers that have ministry experience yet want to better equip themselves in a certain field of study. The nonacademic degree is also designed for the person that does not want an academically strict plan of study or is too remote for a textbook approach.

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary does not offer any academic program.

Degree(s) By Testing

If you are a seasoned minister with at least seven years in the ministry, and 30 years old, this program could be for you. It is a testing of your knowledge on any of the earned non-academic programs listed under each department in this student catalog. Cost: Bachelor \$1250.00, Master \$1350, and Doctorate \$1700. Combination master/doctorate testing is offered at \$2000.

Directive Studies

St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary sometimes uses an educational model in our postgraduate programs that is common in nontraditional education, although it is also found also in traditional institutions, known as *directive studies*. Directive studies merely means that the assigned instructor will look at the doctoral candidate's transcript to evaluate areas of weakness in their academic and professional (ministerial) background. The instructor will then assign courses, projects, papers, etc. to round out the candidate's base of knowledge (subject to the student's acceptance of such a transaction).

The greatest asset for effective integration of truth is a solid knowledge of the Bible. Therefore, courses in Biblical literature are designed to give students an understanding and appreciation of the Word of God and its application. The Biblical literature focus exposes students to a broad spectrum of hermeneutical and exegetical perspectives, tools, and methods so that they may interpret the Bible responsibly and perceptively within a theological-historical framework. Courses in Hebrew and Greek are intended to equip students in language skills needed for studies in the Old and New Testaments, as well as to give them a working knowledge of the Biblical languages.

Students who choose the Biblical literature major choose one of three concentrations. All three concentrations focus on the content of the Bible. English Bible covers the entire Bible; Old Testament emphasizes the content of the Old Testament with the acquisition of the Hebrew language; and the New Testament concentration emphasizes the content of the New Testament with the acquisition of the Greek language.



MISSION STATEMENT

The Graduate School of St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary, educates and equips men and women biblically, theologically, and professionally to serve as Spirit-empowered leaders in the church, society, and the global community.

OVERVIEW

SCUTS Graduate School provides sound competency-based, traditional, non-academic, theological, and Biblical education with a distinctive charismatic dimension. Students are trained to be professionally competent and to place that competency at the disposal of the Holy Spirit as a tool for ministry, in order to bring revival, transformation, and healing. To equip students fully, the Seminary requires training in prayer, divine healing, and signs and wonders, while providing a challenging academic foundation. In the study meeting rooms (virtually and in-person), professors provide Biblical understanding, theological insight, and ministry preparedness in an atmosphere of caring accountability.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

SCUTS Graduate School seeks to prepare students for competent and Spirit-led Christian ministry. The Seminary is called to develop men and women who know the Bible, who have a deep compassion for people, and who, through the empowerment of the Holy Spirit, can revitalize the church, evangelize the world, and heal the nations.

Professional, theological education at this Seminary integrates Biblical and theological training with practical skills. This integration takes place in a charismatic/Pentecostal ethos where the gifts of the Spirit are manifested, and spiritual formation is nurtured.

The Seminary seeks to develop leader's who can communicate the message of the Gospel to those in need of a savior and God's healing power to the world's suffering.

As a multi-denominational Seminary, the SCUTS Graduate School of Theology and Biblical Literature seeks to prepare students for Christian ministry within a broad spectrum of traditions, churches, and cultures.

Although intentionally Pentecostal, it is important to embrace a diversity of theological understandings. This enables students to effectively relate to their unique sphere of influence. SCUTS Graduate School of Theology and Ministry's philosophy seeks to introduce students to the ongoing ecumenical dialogue concerning the nature of the Church and to broaden students' awareness of the larger Body of Christ.

The SCUTS Graduate School exists to prepare men and women for ministry who know the Bible, who have a deep compassion for people, and who, through personal charismatic experiences, can interpret Biblical truth to the Church and society in light of the present-day movement of the Holy Spirit. In other words, it is important to teach, to inform, and to place knowledge as a tool for ministry at the disposal of the Holy Spirit for relevant application.

Importantly, the SCUTS Graduate School of trains Christian leaders to carry God's healing power and seed-faith lifestyle to the world's suffering and lost, whether in America's darkened ghettos and affluent suburbs or in developing countries. The goal of the seminary for its graduates is to carry this vital message of redemption, holiness, and healing to those places "where God's light is dim, where His voice is heard small, where His healing power is not known."

WHY A GRADUATE SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY AND BIBLICAL LITERATUREAT ST. CHRISTY UNIVERSITY OF THEOLOGY & SEMINARY?

The SCUTS Graduate School of Theology and Biblical Literature at St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary is firmly grounded in a concept of abundant life and a charismatic concern for the healing of the totality of human need. The comprehensive, integrated curriculum is designed to balance Bible knowledge and practical, professional ministry skills that will lead to more effective evangelism and healing for body, mind, and spirit. Students are challenged to seek wholeness in their personal lives so they can help those whom they contact to develop wholeness as a way of life.

The following statement by Vice-Chancellor Rev. Dr. Ogoe-Anderson answers "Why a School of Theology and Biblical Literature at St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary?" and explains his vision for those who graduate from the graduate and postgraduate religious programs.

"Two things are essential to a vibrant, fruitful ministry of the Gospel. One, Christian leaders must know the Bible; they must really know the life of Jesus and what the Bible says. And second, Christian leaders must have a deep compassion for people. As I travel through several countries and receive mails from around the world, I feel these voids in Christian leadership. I see a deep hunger in people to know God better. People are searching for someone to explain to them how to live abundantly. They are also aching for love. They long for someone to touch them, to care, to share their deep concerns, and to help them find answers to their needs. These are the very reasons we have a Graduate School of Theology and Biblical Literature at SCUTS to train students to know the Bible and to care for people."

COURSE INFORMATION

Numbering and Sequence

Courses offered in all areas of the Seminary curriculum are appropriate for graduate level students in the Graduate School of Theology and Ministry. In general, 500- and 600-level courses are designed for the religious masters degrees, and 700-level courses are for the religious doctoral degree. The 500-level courses are frequently considered necessary before students can enroll in advanced-level courses represented by the 600 and 700 numbers.

Students may also be required to take prerequisite/leveling courses in addition to courses required for the graduate degree. Prerequisite/leveling courses need to be taken during the student's first semester as a graduate student, and the hours earned from leveling courses are in addition to the hours required for the graduate degree.

Course Offerings

The full-time course load for master's-level students in the Graduate School of Theology and Biblical Literature is 45 Credit Points.

The full-time load for doctoral students in the Graduate School of Theology and Biblical Literature is 30 Credit Points per semester while enrolled in the coursework phase of the program.

Courses by Special Arrangement

With the permission of the faculty advisor, the associate dean, and the instructor of a particular course listed in the catalog, students in special circumstances may complete that course by special arrangement. The objectives of the course, as defined in the current syllabus on file in the office of the dean, must be met. Special assignments, tests, and conferences may be required to satisfy the instructor and coordinator of the area concerned that the objectives have been achieved. A course of study that involves extensive work while the student is absent from the campus may be pursued only upon the approval of a petition presented to the associate dean.

HOLY SPIRIT DISTINCTIVE COURSES

During their first semesters of residency, students enrolled in a master's-level degree program are required to take the graduate course GTHE 510 Holy Spirit Empowerment in Life and Ministry. GTHE 510 deals with part of the basic theological beliefs and lifestyle unique to St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary. The faculty of the SCUTS Graduate School of Theology and Biblical Literature firmly believes that the power and authority entrusted to the Early

Church, as described in the Book of Acts, is still available to believers today. The miraculous power of Christ is to operate "in the now."

The theological faculty encourages all students to enroll in at least one additional course dealing with this vital area of ministry, such as GTHE 663 Charismatic Theology, GTHE 694 The Pentecostal/Charismatic Movements in Historical Perspective, GTHE 696 Divine Healing: A Theological and Historical Study, and GTHE 692 Pneumatology.

EVALUATION

GRADING

Grades are recorded as "A," "B," "C," "D," or "F." Grade points are assigned to each grade: four grade points are allowed for each semester point of "A"; three for "B"; two for "C"; and one for "D." In the Graduate School of Theology and Ministry, only graduate hours for which grades of "A," "B," or "C" are earned count toward the completion of the degree. Grade-point averages appropriate to each program are to be maintained. Courses in which a grade of "D" or "F" is earned are reported on the transcript and are included in determining the grade point average.

The grade of "I" (incomplete) is allowed for work that is incomplete at the time grades are given. It is allowed only after the student establishes with the instructor and the associate dean, by petition, that work is incomplete for good cause. Incompletes are granted only for extenuating circumstances, normally prolonged illness that is verified by medical documentation or death in the family. Petitions for an incomplete grade must be granted before the last day of regular classes. It is the responsibility of the student to make up any incomplete work and have the professor submit a grade change to the dean. If this is not done in the subsequent semester, the incomplete is changed to an "F."

Other marks used in grade reporting are "WP" (withdraw/passing), and "WF" (withdraw/failing), and "WM" (withdraw/military). When a course is dropped after two weeks, a "WP" is recorded if the student is passing at the time of the drop. If the student is not passing, a "WF" is recorded. Any student who withdraws from a class after the eighth week receives a "WF." The "WF" is counted as an "F" in determining the grade point average.

Graduate students are required to maintain a cumulative 3.00 grade-point average to remain in good standing and to graduate. A grade of "C" or better counts for degree credit. Students who fall below this level are placed on probation, and students on probation whose cumulative grade-point average remains below 3.00 for two consecutive semesters are suspect to suspension from the program. Progress evaluation is normally conducted when a student has earned, 40 credit points or more credit points. In addition, any student who has earned either three grades of "C" or lower, two "Ds," or an "F" while matriculating through SCUTS in a Graduate School of Theology and Biblical Literature programs are subject to suspension from the program. For purposes of this suspension policy, successfully retaking (raising the grade to "C" or better) does not negate the previous grade even though it does replace the grade for GPA purposes. Petitions for Policy Exception may be considered if there are exceptional extenuating circumstances existing.

Students are also evaluated and required to meet appropriate standards in three specific areas beyond academics: 1) Spiritual Maturity; 2) Emotional Intelligence and 3) Social Adeptness. Students may be placed on probation leading to suspension from the program if they fail in one or more of these areas.

TEACHING ASSISTANTSHIPS

Teaching assistantships are available to students primarily in the Religious Masters and Doctorate degree programs. Responsibilities are usually in the theological undergraduate programs of St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary. Assistantships may include working under the supervision of a faculty advisor to enrich existing course content, developing new teaching resources, leading undergraduate Bible and theology discussion groups, participating in limited teaching and lectures, or preparing special projects and assignments. These positions require an average of 15 hours per week.

According to Ephesians 4:11, evangelists, pastors and teachers have been appointed to the Church to prepare God's people for works of service so that the Body of Christ may be built up. RELIGIOUS MASTER OF BIBLICAL COUNSELING (RMBC)

The Religious Master of Biblical Counseling (RMBC) degree program is designed to prepare students for the specialized ministry of Christian counseling in the contexts of the local church, or church-related agencies. The program enables students to thoughtfully integrate and ethically implement the most effective models and theories of Christian counseling with a coherent Biblical/theological perspective and sensitivity to the Holy Spirit's activity. Since helping hurting people is an essential element of the gospel, this program equips students to therapeutically respond to the opportunities of global diversity in facilitating healing and wholeness in all areas of life. Three specialization areas in the RMBC degree are offered:

- 1) R.M. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Marital and Family Therapy (preparation for the Certified Christian Marital and Family Therapist, CCMFT).
- 2) R.M. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Addictions and Drug Counseling (preparation for the Certified Additions and Drug Counsellor for Christians, CADCC).
- 3) R.M. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Pastoral Counseling.

All three specializations share the same common core, SCUTS distinctives and proficiencies, and Biblical and theological foundations courses.

Because students are called to the counseling ministry at all stages of life, no counseling prerequisites are required. The courses within the degree, however, are sequential and need to be completed in a specified order. Advisors guide students in making these selections.

The Religious Master of Biblical Counseling (RMBC) program is not designed to prepare students for professional licensure. RMBC programs are not designed to qualify students or prepare students to meet the licensure requirements for Licensed Professional Counselors (LPC), Licensed Alcohol and Drug Counselor (LADC), and for Licensed Marital and Family Therapists (LMFT). While licensure requirements vary across States, students are encouraged to contact individual State or national licensing offices to determine if courses completed in this non-academic religious degree program satisfy the requirements to meet their licensure, or if any additional formal academic coursework is required to meet State or a Country's licensure. .

In conjunction with School of Religious Ministry and Strategic Leadership, the College of Theology and Biblical Literature (Seminary) offer degree programs that are designed for those who have been out of college for at least over five years or lack formal college education but have documented practical years of religious ministry experience and are looking for an affordable way to study the Bible, theology, spirituality, and ministry from both pastoral and community viewpoints. The degree programs are built around core courses, a choice of specializations (called "concentrations"), and a research project. A cohort of students follow the same sequence of courses for their core courses but separate as they choose from the specializations available.

SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

MASTER OF THEOLOGY (Th. M)

The Master of Theology (Th. M) degree program is designed to equip graduates for effective ministry in the local church, para-church organizations, and other ministry contexts. The degree provides a foundation in ministerial theory and practice that can assist students to pursue ministry vocations. It seeks to develop the essential knowledge and skills for lay positions in the church or specialized professions in both church and community.

Two specializations in the Master of Practical Theology degree are offered:

- 1) Practical Theology (PT)
- 2) Teaching Ministries (TMC)

These options share the same prerequisites, SCUTS distinctives, and Biblical/theological courses.

This degree program prepares leaders by increasing their competence in and understanding of the Word of God through hermeneutical and study skills and by developing a theological framework for their understanding of the teaching of Scripture and for the practices of ministry. In addition to a strong Biblical and theological foundation, the curriculum is flexible enough to meet the demands of both professional and lay positions.

The degree program is structured to provide a strong Biblical/theological/practical ministry foundation for leadership and includes flexibility for students to structure their own programs to meet perceived needs in ministry. The practicum provides supervised practice in church or community contexts that encourage the integration of © ST. MASTER OF BIBLICAL LITERATURE (M. BLit)

The Master of Biblical Literature (M.BLit) degree program is designed to give students hermeneutical and exegetical perspectives, tools, and methods to develop a comprehensive understanding of the Old and New Testament and to interpret Biblical content responsibly and perceptively. This program enables students to integrate hermeneutical and exegetical insights into a theological/historical framework shaped by interaction with the charismatic ethos of St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary. Three concentrations in the M. BLit degree are offered:

- Biblical Literature (BLC)
- Advanced Languages (ALC)
- Judaic-Christian Studies (JCSC)

Students acquire a working knowledge of Biblical languages (Hebrew and Greek). In order to provide students with a knowledge of the theological and historical context in which the Church operates, this program includes a Biblical, theological, and historical studies core.

Proficiency in Biblical Greek and Hebrew is an integral part of this program. Transcript credit and proficiency in both Greek and Hebrew are required for graduation. For students pursuing the literature focus or the Judaic-Christian studies, the first Biblical language is a prerequisite, but the second language is part of the degree program and counts toward fulfilling the degree requirements. For students pursuing the advanced languages concentration, proficiency in both Biblical languages is a prerequisite.

Biblical Literature Prerequisite Courses

Students intending to pursue the Biblical literature program are required to satisfy a minimum of 95 Credit Points of Biblical literature. Those who have not fulfilled this prerequisite requirement in bachelor's degree studies with at least a "B" grade and demonstrated current proficiency (a minimum of 70% on a written examination) may take the following prerequisite/leveling courses to prepare them for the graduate coursework. Biblical Literature with a Concentration in Advanced Languages Prerequisite Courses

All students intending to pursue the Biblical literature program with the advanced languages concentration must demonstrate proficiency in either Biblical Greek I and II or Hebrew I and II at the time of matriculation. They may do so by transferring credit from another university or by having SCUTS credit for Hebrew I and II and or Greek I and II with grades of "C" or better. MASTER OF DIVINITY (M.Div)

The Master of Divinity religious degree is a 140 and 150 Credit Points program structured around field education and the three curricula areas of the Seminary (Biblical Literature, Theological/Historical Studies and Practices of Ministry). Students are required to enroll in two sessions of field education after 50% of their coursework is complete. Preparatory courses are offered and provided to all students to bridge deficient areas or enhance areas of interest, including Biblical literature, and theological/historical studies. Because SCUTS also has graduate programs in Christian education and Ministry business, students may choose to use a limited number of these elective credit points for crossdisciplinary training.

Two specializations in the M. Div religious degree are offered:

- 1) Master of Divinity with in-depth studies in Practices of Ministry (M.Div/PM)

RELIGIOUS DOCTOR OF BIBLICAL COUNSELING (RDBC)

The Religious Doctor of Biblical Counseling (RDBC) degree program is designed to prepare students for the specialized ministry of Christian counseling in the contexts of the local church, or church-related agencies. The program enables students to thoughtfully integrate and ethically implement the most effective models and theories of Christian counseling with a coherent Biblical/theological perspective and sensitivity to the Holy Spirit's activity. Since helping hurting people is an essential element of the gospel, this program equips students to therapeutically respond to the opportunities of global diversity in facilitating healing and wholeness in all areas of life. Three specialization areas in the RDBC degree are offered:

- 1) R.D. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Marital and Family Therapy (preparation for the Certified Christian Marital and Family Therapist, CCMFT).
- R.D. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Addictions and Drug Counseling (preparation for the Certified Additions and Drug Counsellor for Christians, CADCC).
- 3) R.D. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Pastoral Counseling.

All three specializations share the same common core, SCUTS distinctives and proficiencies, and Biblical and theological foundations courses.

Because students are called to the counseling ministry at all stages of life, no counseling prerequisites are required. The courses within the degree, however, are sequential and need to be completed in a specified order. Advisors guide students in making these selections.

In conjunction with School of Religious Ministry and Strategic Leadership, the School of Theology and Biblical Literature (Seminary) offer advanced degree programs that are designed for those who have been out of college for at least over seven years or lack formal college education but have documented practical years of religious ministry experience and are looking for an affordable way to study the Bible, theology, spirituality, and ministry from both pastoral and community viewpoints. The degree programs are built around core courses, a choice of specializations (called "concentrations"), and a research project. A cohort of students follow the same sequence of courses for their core courses but separate as they choose from the specializations available.

DOCTOR OF PRACTICAL THEOLOGY (Th. D)

The Doctor of Theology (Th. D) degree program is designed to equip graduates for effective ministry in the local church, para-church organizations, and other ministry contexts. The advanced degree provides a foundation in ministerial theory and practice that can assist students to pursue ministry vocations. It seeks to develop the essential knowledge and skills for lay positions in the church or specialized professions in both church and community.

Two specializations in the Doctor of Practical Theology degree are offered:

- 1) Practical Theology (PT)
- 2) Teaching Ministries (TMC)

These options share the same prerequisites, SCUTS distinctives, and Biblical/theological courses.

This degree program prepares leaders by increasing their competence in and understanding of the Word of God through hermeneutical and study skills and by developing a theological framework for their understanding of the teaching of Scripture and for the practices of ministry. In addition to a strong Biblical and theological foundation, the curriculum is flexible enough to meet the demands of both professional and lay positions.

The degree program is structured to provide a strong Biblical/theological/practical ministry foundation for leadership and includes flexibility for students to structure their own programs to meet perceived needs in ministry. The practicum provides supervised practice in church or community contexts that encourage the integration of Biblical and theological understanding with practical ministry strategies.

Applicants for the Doctor of Practical Theology degree programs should have completed 2 prerequisite courses as listed below in their master's degree programs.

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Students who have not met this requirement at the time of matriculation must enroll in the required prerequisite courses. These courses should be selected in consultation with the faculty advisor. Credit points from prerequisite courses do apply toward the graduate degree.

DOCTOR OF BIBLICAL LITERATURE (D. BLit)

The Doctor of Biblical Literature (D.BLit) degree program is an advanced vocational degree program designed to give students hermeneutical and exegetical perspectives, tools, and methods to develop a comprehensive understanding of the Old and New Testament and to interpret Biblical content responsibly and perceptively. This program enables students to integrate hermeneutical and exegetical insights into a theological/historical framework shaped by interaction with the charismatic ethos of St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary. Three concentrations in the D. BLit degree are offered:

- 1) Biblical Literature (BLC)
- 2) Advanced Languages (ALC)
- 3) Judaic-Christian Studies (JCSC)

Students acquire a working knowledge of Biblical languages (Hebrew and Greek). In order to provide students with a knowledge of the theological and historical context in which the Church operates, this program includes a Biblical, theological, and historical studies core.

Proficiency in Biblical Greek and Hebrew is an integral part of this program. Transcript credit and proficiency in both Greek and Hebrew are required for graduation. For students pursuing the literature focus or the Judaic-Christian studies, the first Biblical language is a prerequisite, but the second language is part of the degree program and counts toward fulfilling the degree requirements. For students pursuing the advanced languages concentration, proficiency in both Biblical languages is a prerequisite.

Biblical Literature Prerequisite Courses

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Students intending to pursue the Biblical literature program are required to satisfy a minimum of 95 Credit Points of Biblical literature. Those who have not fulfilled this prerequisite requirement in bachelor's degree studies with at least a "B" grade and demonstrated current proficiency (a minimum of 70% on a written examination) may take the following prerequisite/leveling courses to prepare them for the graduate coursework. DOCTOR OF DIVINITY (D.Div)

The Doctor of Divinity religious degree is a 140 and 150 Credit Points program structured around field education and the three curricula areas of the Seminary (Biblical Literature, Theological/Historical Studies and Practices of Ministry). Students are required to enroll in two sessions of field education after 50% of their coursework is complete. Preparatory courses are offered and provided to all students to bridge deficient areas or enhance areas of interest, including Biblical literature, and theological/historical studies. Because SCUTS also has graduate programs in Christian education and Ministry business, students may choose to use a limited number of these elective credit points for crossdisciplinary training.

Two specializations in the D. Div religious degree are offered:

- 1) Doctor of Divinity with in-depth studies in Practices of Ministry (D. Div/PM).
- 2) Doctor of Divinity with a concentration in Pastoral Care and Chaplaincy (D. Div/PCHC)

Both options share the same Common Core comprising: Prerequisites, Biblical Literature, Theological/Historical Studies, and Assessments/SCUTS Distinctives courses.

SCHOOL OF BIBLICAL COUNSELING

RELIGIOUS MASTER OF BIBLICAL COUNSELING (RMBC)

The Religious Master of Biblical Counseling (RMBC) degree program is designed to prepare students for the specialized ministry of Christian counseling in the contexts of the local church, or church-related agencies. The program enables students to thoughtfully integrate and ethically implement the most effective models and theories of Christian counseling with a coherent Biblical/theological perspective and sensitivity to the Holy Spirit's activity. Since helping hurting people is an essential element of the gospel, this program equips students to therapeutically respond to the opportunities of global diversity in facilitating healing and wholeness in all areas of life. Three specialization areas in the RMBC degree are offered:

- 1) R.M. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Marital and Family Therapy (preparation for the Certified Christian Marital and Family Therapist, CCMFT).
- 2) R.M. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Addictions and Drug Counseling (preparation for the Certified Additions and Drug Counsellor for Christians, CADCC).
- 3) R.M. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Pastoral Counseling.

All three specializations share the same common core, SCUTS distinctives and proficiencies, and Biblical and theological foundations courses.

Because students are called to the counseling ministry at all stages of life, no counseling prerequisites are required. The courses within the degree, however, are sequential and need to be completed in a specified order. Advisors guide students in making these selections.

PROFESSIONAL AND STATE LICENSURE DISCLAIMER

The Religious Master of Biblical Counseling (RMBC) program is not designed to prepare students for professional licensure. RMBC programs are not designed to qualify students or prepare students to meet the licensure requirements for Licensed Professional Counselors (LPC), Licensed Alcohol and Drug Counselor (LADC), and for Licensed Marital and Family Therapists (LMFT). While licensure requirements vary across States, students are encouraged to contact individual State or national licensing offices to determine if courses completed in this non-academic religious degree program satisfy the requirements to meet their licensure, or if any additional formal academic coursework is required to meet State or a Country's licensure. .

MASTER OF THEOLOGY (Th. M)

The Master of Theology (Th. M) degree program is designed to equip graduates for effective ministry in the local church, para-church organizations, and other ministry contexts. The degree provides a foundation in ministerial theory and practice that can assist students to pursue ministry vocations. It seeks to develop the essential knowledge and skills for lay positions in the church or specialized professions in both church and community.

Two specializations in the Master of Practical Theology degree are offered:

- 1) Practical Theology (PT)
- 2) Teaching Ministries (TMC)

These options share the same prerequisites, SCUTS distinctives, and Biblical/theological courses.

This degree program prepares leaders by increasing their competence in and understanding of the Word of God through hermeneutical and study skills and by developing a theological framework for their understanding of the teaching of Scripture and for the practices of ministry. In addition to a strong Biblical and theological foundation, the curriculum is flexible enough to meet the demands of both professional and lay positions.

The degree program is structured to provide a strong Biblical/theological/practical ministry foundation for leadership and includes flexibility for students to structure their own programs to meet perceived needs in ministry. The practicum provides supervised practice in church or community contexts that encourage the integration of Biblical and theological understanding with practical ministry strategies.

Applicants for the Master of Theology degree programs should have completed 2 prerequisite courses as listed below in their bachelor's degree programs. Students who have not met this requirement at the time of matriculation must enroll in the required prerequisite courses. These courses should be selected in consultation with the faculty advisor. MASTER OF BIBLICAL LITERATURE (M. BLit)

The Master of Biblical Literature (M.BLit) degree program is designed to give students hermeneutical and exegetical perspectives, tools, and methods to develop a comprehensive understanding of the Old and New Testament and to interpret Biblical content responsibly and perceptively. This program enables students to integrate hermeneutical and exegetical insights into a theological/historical framework shaped by interaction with the charismatic ethos of St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary. Three concentrations in the M. BLit degree are offered:

- Biblical Literature (BLC)
- Advanced Languages (ALC)
- Judaic-Christian Studies (JCSC)

Students acquire a working knowledge of Biblical languages (Hebrew and Greek). In order to provide students with a knowledge of the theological and historical context in which the Church operates, this program includes a Biblical, theological, and historical studies core.

Proficiency in Biblical Greek and Hebrew is an integral part of this program. Transcript credit and proficiency in both Greek and Hebrew are required for graduation. For students pursuing the literature focus or the Judaic-Christian studies, the first Biblical language is a prerequisite, but the second language is part of the degree program and counts toward fulfilling the degree requirements. For students pursuing the advanced languages concentration, proficiency in both Biblical languages is a prerequisite.

Biblical Literature Prerequisite Courses

Students intending to pursue the Biblical literature program are required to satisfy a minimum of 95 Credit Points of Biblical literature. Those who have not fulfilled this prerequisite requirement in bachelor's degree studies with at least a "B" grade and demonstrated current proficiency (a minimum of 70% on a written examination) may take the following prerequisite/leveling courses to prepare them for the graduate coursework. Credit points from prerequisite courses do apply toward the graduate degree.

MASTER OF DIVINITY (M.Div)

The Master of Divinity religious degree is a 140 and 150 Credit Points program structured around field education and the three curricula areas of the Seminary (Biblical Literature, Theological/Historical Studies and Practices of Ministry). Students are required to enroll in two sessions of field education after 50% of their coursework is complete. Preparatory courses are offered and provided to all students to bridge deficient areas or enhance areas of interest, including Biblical literature, and theological/historical studies. Because SCUTS also has graduate programs in Christian education and Ministry business, students may choose to use a limited number of these elective credit points for crossdisciplinary training.

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SCHOOL OF BIBLICAL COUNSELING

RELIGIOUS DOCTOR OF BIBLICAL COUNSELING (RDBC)

The Religious Doctor of Biblical Counseling (RDBC) degree program is designed to prepare students for the specialized ministry of Christian counseling in the contexts of the local church, or church-related agencies. The program enables students to thoughtfully integrate and ethically implement the most effective models and theories of Christian counseling with a coherent Biblical/theological perspective and sensitivity to the Holy Spirit's activity. Since helping hurting people is an essential element of the gospel, this program equips students to therapeutically respond to the opportunities of global diversity in facilitating healing and wholeness in all areas of life. Three specialization areas in the RDBC degree are offered:

- 1) R.D. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Marital and Family Therapy (preparation for the Certified Christian Marital and Family Therapist, CCMFT).
- 2) R.D. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Addictions and Drug Counseling (preparation for the Certified Additions and Drug Counsellor for Christians, CADCC).
- 3) R.D. in Biblical Counseling with a concentration in Pastoral Counseling.

All three specializations share the same common core, SCUTS distinctives and proficiencies, and Biblical and theological foundations courses.

Because students are called to the counseling ministry at all stages of life, no counseling prerequisites are required. The courses within the degree, however, are sequential and need to be completed in a specified order. Advisors guide students in making these selections.

SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY AND BIBLICAL LITERATURE (SEMINARY)

In conjunction with School of Religious Ministry and Strategic Leadership, the School of Theology and Biblical Literature (Seminary) offer advanced degree programs that are designed for those who have been out of college for at least over seven years or lack formal college education but have documented practical years of religious ministry experience and are looking for an affordable way to study the Bible, theology, spirituality, and ministry from both pastoral and community viewpoints. The degree programs are built around core courses, a choice of specializations (called "concentrations"), and a research project. A cohort of students follow the same sequence of courses for their core courses but separate as they choose from the specializations available.

DOCTOR OF PRACTICAL THEOLOGY (Th. D)

The Doctor of Theology (Th. D) degree program is designed to equip graduates for effective ministry in the local church, para-church organizations, and other ministry contexts. The advanced degree provides a foundation in ministerial theory and practice that can assist students to pursue ministry vocations. It seeks to develop the essential knowledge and skills for lay positions in the church or specialized professions in both church and community.

Two specializations in the Doctor of Practical Theology degree are offered:

- 1) Practical Theology (PT)
- 2) Teaching Ministries (TMC)

These options share the same prerequisites, SCUTS distinctives, and Biblical/theological courses.

This degree program prepares leaders by increasing their competence in and understanding of the Word of God through hermeneutical and study skills and by developing a theological framework for their understanding of the teaching of Scripture and for the practices of ministry. In addition to a strong Biblical and theological foundation, the curriculum is flexible enough to meet the demands of both professional and lay positions.

The degree program is structured to provide a strong Biblical/theological/practical ministry foundation for leadership and includes flexibility for students to structure their own programs to meet perceived needs in ministry. The practicum provides supervised practice in church or community contexts that encourage the integration of Biblical and theological understanding with practical ministry strategies.

Applicants for the Doctor of Practical Theology degree programs should have completed 2 prerequisite courses as listed below in their master's degree programs.

DOCTOR OF BIBLICAL LITERATURE (D. BLit)

The Doctor of Biblical Literature (D.B.Lit) degree program is an advanced vocational degree program designed to give students hermeneutical and exegetical perspectives, tools, and methods to develop a comprehensive understanding of the Old and New Testament and to interpret Biblical content responsibly and perceptively. This program enables students to integrate hermeneutical and exegetical insights into a theological/historical framework shaped by interaction with the charismatic ethos of St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary. Three concentrations in the D. BLit degree are offered:

- 1) Biblical Literature (BLC)
- 2) Advanced Languages (ALC)
- 3) Judaic-Christian Studies (JCSC)

Students acquire a working knowledge of Biblical languages (Hebrew and Greek). In order to provide students with a knowledge of the theological and historical context in which the Church operates, this program includes a Biblical, theological, and historical studies core.

Proficiency in Biblical Greek and Hebrew is an integral part of this program. Transcript credit and proficiency in both Greek and Hebrew are required for graduation. For students pursuing the literature focus or the Judaic-Christian studies, the first Biblical language is a prerequisite, but the second language is part of the degree program and counts toward fulfilling the degree requirements. For students pursuing the advanced languages concentration, proficiency in both Biblical languages is a prerequisite.

Biblical Literature Prerequisite Courses

Students intending to pursue the Biblical literature program are required to satisfy a minimum of 95 Credit Points of Biblical literature. Those who have not fulfilled this prerequisite requirement in bachelor's degree studies with at least a "B" grade and demonstrated current proficiency (a minimum of 70% on a written examination) may take the following prerequisite/leveling courses to prepare them for the graduate coursework. DOCTOR OF DIVINITY (D.Div)

The Doctor of Divinity religious degree is a 140 and 150 Credit Points program structured around field education and the three curricula areas of the Seminary (Biblical Literature, Theological/Historical Studies and Practices of Ministry). Students are required to enroll in two sessions of field education after 50% of their coursework is complete. Preparatory courses are offered and provided to all students to bridge deficient areas or enhance areas of interest, including Biblical literature, and theological/historical studies. Because SCUTS also has graduate programs in Christian education and Ministry business, students may choose to use a limited number of these elective credit points for crossdisciplinary training.

Two specializations in the D. Div religious degree are offered:

- 1) Doctor of Divinity with in-depth studies in Practices of Ministry (D. Div/PM).
- Doctor of Divinity with a concentration in Pastoral Care and Chaplaincy (D. Div/PCHC)

Both options share the same Common Core comprising: Prerequisites, Biblical Literature, Theological/Historical Studies, and Assessments/SCUTS Distinctives courses.

Learning Management Fee

Students beginning a degree program at SCUTS will be charged a one-time per program Technology and Learning Management Fee of \$250.00 that will be charged on the 8th day of your course (the date you vest in your course). Students will be required to pay the fee again only IF after graduating from one program they begin another. If a student changes specialization within the same program, they will not be responsible for paying the fee again until/unless they graduate and re-enter another program. Students who do a program change from one degree-seeking program to another will be charged the TLMF fees associated with the new degree-seeking program.

Course Materials Fee

Students in a degree program at SCUTS will NOT be charged a Course Materials Fee (CMF) per course. SCUTS will NOT automatically provide students with all of their course materials once they have accepted their course. Students are responsible for purchasing their own textbooks and course materials as per the course resources requirements. SCUTS may however facilitate the purchase of such course materials at additional fees to the student requesting such assistance.

Enrollment Period

The Enrollment Agreement covers the period of time from the first day of your first vested course and ends when degree requirements for your program are met. To vest in a course, you must accept the course and persist beyond the 7th day of the course. Given SCUTS's flexible scheduling options, this period of time will vary for each student. If you cease enrollment at SCUTS, through either withdrawal or dismissal, and wish to return, you may be required to complete a new Enrollment Agreement and a new enrollment period will be established.

Add/Drop Period

You may add, cancel or withdraw from a course at any time. To cancel or withdraw from a course, you can contact your Academic and Finance Advisor at <u>learnerservices@saintchristy.org</u>. Cancellation or Withdrawal will be effective on the date that the notice is received.

If you wish to add a course outside of the prescribed degree plan, you will take the course as a non-degree seeking student.

If you withdraw from a course, you are subject to the refund policy outlined in the catalog and are responsiblefor repaying loans obtained plus interest, less the amount of any refund due under the refund policy.

Student's Right to Cancel

You have the right to cancel the Enrollment Agreement and obtain a full refund of charges through attendance in Week 1 (day 7 of the first course). If you wish to cancel your enrollment agreement, you must contact your Academic and Finance Advisor at <u>learnerservices@saintchristy.org</u> prior to attending Week 2 of your first course. Cancellation or Withdrawal will be effective on the date that the notice is received.

The University reserves the right to cancel or terminate the agreement if you fail to accept and attend your first course, meet basic admission requirements during provisional admissions periods, violate the Student Code of Conduct, fail to make satisfactory course progress, fail to make payment in accordance with the terms of the student finance agreement, and/or fail to meet attendance requirements as outlined in the <u>SCUTS Course</u> <u>Catalog.</u>

If you obtain loan(s) to pay for your educational program, you have the responsibility to repay the full amount of the loan plus interest, less the amount of any refund that is owed under the refund policy.

Refund Policy

Arbitration Clause

Agreement to Arbitrate

Any controversy or claim arising out of, or relating to this Agreement, no matter how described, pleaded or styled, including without limitation the student's recruitment, enrollment, or attendance at St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary (SCUTS), or the education provided by SCUTS, or its billing, financial aid, financing options, disbursement of funds, excess funds or career service assistance, shall have the opportunity to work with SCUTS or the California Bureau of Postsecondary Education. If not resolved in accordance with the Grievance Procedures, an individual can work through grievance by binding arbitration in accordance with the Commercial Arbitration Rules of the American Arbitration Association (including the Supplemental Procedures for Consumer-Related Disputes) or connect directly with the California Bureau of Postsecondary Education. Information about the arbitration process can be obtained from the American Arbitration Association (AAA) at www.adr.org or 1-800-778-7879 or California Bureau of Postsecondary Education at 916-431-6959.

If a student chose to continue with the arbitration process, the parties are not required to arbitrate claims by either party against the other party for relief of \$2,500 or less which could be brought in a court of competent jurisdiction.

The student agrees that the arbitrator, and not any federal, state or local court or agency, shall have the exclusive authority to resolve any dispute relating to the interpretation, applicability, enforceability or formation of this Agreement to Arbitrate, including, but not limited to any claims that all or any part of this Agreement is void or voidable. For purposes of this paragraph, the term "St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary" includes St. Christy University of Theology & Seminary Inc, its officers, directors and employees, and its affiliates, subsidiaries and parents, and any officers, directors or employees of such entities. The arbitrator shall apply federal law to the fullest extent possible and the substantive and procedural provisions of the Federal Arbitration Act (9 U.S.C. §§1-16) and any and all issues relating to the enforcement of the Agreement to Arbitrate (AAA) and the arbitrability of claims between the parties.

Location of Arbitration: Any such arbitration shall take place before a single neutral arbitrator in the county in which the student resides unless the student and the University agree otherwise. The arbitrator must have knowledge of and actual experience in the administration and operation of postsecondary educational institutions unless the parties agree otherwise.

Relief and remedies: The arbitrator shall have the authority to award monetary damages measured by the prevailing party's actual damages and may grant any nonmonetary remedy or relief that the arbitrator deems just and equitable and within the scope of this Agreement to Arbitrate. Judgment on the award rendered by the arbitrator may be entered in any court having jurisdiction. The arbitrator shall not have any authority to award punitive damages, treble damages, consequential or indirect damages, or other damages not measured by the prevailing party's actual damages unless such relief is expressly provided for by applicable law. The arbitrator also shall not have any authority to alter any grade issued to a student or to require the University to change any of its policies or procedures.

Costs of Arbitration: The parties shall bear their own costs and expenses of arbitration, including their own counsel, experts, witnesses, and presentation of proof. Except as may be required by law, neither a party nor an arbitrator may disclose the existence, content, or results of any such arbitration without the prior written consent of both parties. All fees and expenses of the arbitrator and administrative fees and expenses of the arbitration shall be paid by the parties as provided by the Commercial Arbitration Rules of the AAA governing the proceeding, including the Supplementary Procedures for Consumer-Related Disputes, to the extent applicable, or by specific ruling by the arbitrator, or by agreement of the parties.

Class and consolidated actions: There shall be no right or authority for any claims within the scope of this Agreement to Arbitrate to be arbitrated or litigated on a class basis or for the claims of more than one student to be arbitrated or litigated jointly or consolidated with any other student's claim.

Arbitrator's Award: At the request of either party, the arbitrator shall render a written award briefly setting forth his or her essential findings and conclusions. Judgment on the award rendered by the arbitrator may be entered in any court having jurisdiction. Severability and right to waive: If any part or parts of this Agreement to Arbitrate are found to be invalid or unenforceable by a decision of a tribunal of competent jurisdiction, then suchspecific part or parts shall be of no force and effect and shall be severed, but the remainder of this Agreement to Arbitrate may be specifically waived by the party against whom the claim is asserted. Such waiver shall not waive or affect any other portion of this Agreement to Arbitrate.
